WILLIAM MILLIGAN

2ND KENTUCKY CAVALRY CO. B

FOURTEENTH CORP

GEN'L MC COOK'S 2ND DIV. GEN'L ROUSSEAU'S 3RD DIVISION ARMY OF THE CUMBERLAND

William Milligan was born in New York, NY. in 1833. He was a Carpenter by trade.

He mustered into the Army on August 27, 1861 at Camp Joe Holt, Ky. and was then transferred to Camp Muldraugh's Hill, Ky. on September 27, 1861.

January 1862 he was present for duty.

February and March 1862 William was absent on extra or daily duty as Provost Guard.

April 1862 to August 1862 he was absent on detachment duty as Provost Guard in Gen'l Mc Cook's 2nd Division.

September 1862 and October 1862 William was present for duty.

November 1862 he was present for duty.

December 1862 to January 1863 William Milligan was absent as Provost Guard in teh 2nd Division. (Mc Cook's)

February 1863 to March 1863 he was present for duty.

March 1, 1863 William Milligan was promoted to Sergent.

April 1863 to June 1863 he was present for duty.

July 1863 to December 1863 he was present for duty.

January 1864 William Milligan was absent in Nashville, getting horses.

February 1864 to June 1864 he was present for duty.

July 1864 and August 1864 William was absent, sick at Cartersville, GA., as of August 3, 1864.

* July 10-22, 1864 Maj.- General Lovell Rousseau took the 2nd Kentucky Cavalry on his Alabama Raid. This raid was noted for breaking up the railroad lines before Georgia and Alabama. Cartersville, GA. is on the route taken, it is near Marietta, GA.

September 26, 1864 William Milligan mustered out of the Army at Nashville, Tenn. for reason of expiration of his term of service, which was three years.

PROVOST GUARD DUTIES:

Suppression of marauding and depredations, and of all brawls and disturbances beyond the limits of the camps.

Prevention of straggling on the march.

Suppression of gambling houses, drinking houses, or barrooms, and brothels.

Regulation of hotels, taverns, markets, and places of public amusement.

Searches, seizures and arrests. Execution of sentences of general courts-martial, involving imprisonment of capital punishment. Enforcement of orders prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, whether by tradesmen or sutlers, and of orders respecting passes.

Deserters from the enemy.

Countersigning safeguards.

Passes to citizens within the lines, and for purposes of trade.

Complaints of citizens as to the conduct of the soldiers.

The provost guard usually composed of a Cavalry unit and a battalion of Infantry.

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
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

The September 1866 Muster Roll for Company H, Seventh U. S. Cavalry lists William Milligan as having enlisted on August 17, 1866 at Philadelphia, PA.

I found Milligan mentioned by name again when he deserted in July, 1867. Apparently, he did not get very far. The record indicates that he was apprehended and confined at Fort Sedgwick, Colorado Territory on July 17. He was sentenced to spend the next several months in the post guard house. The last entry concerning his confinement is shown on the roll for March, 1868. The "present and absent" section indicates he was returned to duty.

As you know, Milligan was killed in action at the Battle of the Washita, November 27, 1868. This is confirmed on the Muster Roll for that month.

I trust this information will be of help to you, though I see no connection between this William Milligan and the Milligan of the Second Kentucky Cavalry. It appears to me they were two different individuals. Although everyone seems to want an arm used by the Seventh Cavalry, there is certainly nothing wrong with having a Colt with what appears to be firm provenance to a war-time volunteer unit. You should be able to trace the Second Kentucky's service rather easily through that state's archives.
